
All of these are ways in which the Body of Christ which is St. Mary's Church is making the hope and grace of the Risen One known in the world. We are the sign of Christ's resurrection.

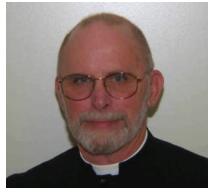
ST. GASTRONOME DINNER - MAY 6

For starters, on behalf of Manna Food Bank and the many people they serve, I'd like to extend a hearty "thank you" to all who participated in our annual *Measure of Faith* food drive. We collected food every Sunday in April to combat hunger in our area. The food has been delivered to Manna; and, I'm happy to tell you that St. Mary's collected 632 pounds of food!! That's 100 pounds more than last year. The folks at Manna were most appreciative! Again, thank you!

Here are some updates related to on-going ministries at St. Mary's. The Adopt-a-Street program with Temple Beth HaTephila will take place on **Sunday May 22 at 2:00 pm**. As before, we will be cleaning MLK Blvd. Sign-up sheets will be posted and I hope you will participate.

As was noted last month, the *Room In The Inn*, a shelter for homeless women, will take place the week of **July 3-9**. If you remember, we have partnered with St. Mark's Lutheran and Temple Beth HaTephila in this exciting venture. The women will be sleeping at St. Mary's that week with others providing meals and many of the other necessary support services. Michael Ashmore will be posting volunteer sheets well in advance and training will be provided.

To override the costs involved with this ministry, the 3 participating congregations will be hosting a Spaghetti Dinner as a means of raising funds. It will be held at Temple Beth HaTephila on **May 25 at 6:00**. The cost will be a donation to cover the purchase of a blanket or pillow. (\$5/pillow--\$10/blanket—families/\$15) All are welcome to join us whether you're participating in the program or not. So please mark these dates on your calendars. Be mindful that these dates also offer us a great way to actually meet and talk to our neighbors!

When you consider becoming involved, please remember the words of Jesus, "I come *to serve, not to be served.*"

BREAD AND WINE

During Lent the Adult Forum explored how bread and wine are made and their place in our theology. Those attending made and sampled a variety of Eucharistic breads from the Orthodox, Roman and Anglican traditions and settled on a recipe that was a blend of all three. This is the altar bread which we are now using at the 11:00 am Mass. We are still working toward finding the best way to score and break the bread so that the pieces are neither too large nor too small. Thank you for your patience while that is worked out. Wine was also made during Lent and it should be ready for service at the Altar in the next few weeks.

PASTYME at ST. MARY'S - JUNE 5

On **Sunday, June 5 at 5:00 pm**, *Pastyme* will celebrate Evensong at St. Mary's Church. I'm sure that many of you have heard this wonderful group, but for those of you who haven't please take advantage of the opportunity. The combination of the traditional Anglican Evensong with the exquisite music of *Pastyme* will be an experience you don't want to miss.

Pastyme is a vocal group from Asheville which performs a cappella music of all kinds. Even though *Pastyme* has its roots in the sacred and secular music of the High Renaissance, the group performs a cappella music from a wide variety of literature, from classical to jazz, for concerts, church services, and special events. The group has no director; instead, all contribute to the selection, artistic interpretation, and development of each piece. *Pastyme* was formed in 1999 by a group of friends who enjoyed making music with each other. While there have been some changes in membership, four of the original members remain. The members of *Pastyme* are all active in the music community of Asheville, singing with church choirs, the opera and musical theatre. The group has also performed at numerous venues and churches in the Southeast, including the Piccolo Spoleto Festival in Charleston, SC, May 2001, the Cathedral of St. Philip, Atlanta, October 2005 and April 2007, and the Echo Early Music Festival, 2009.

Pastyme has completed its first CD, *Es ist ein Rose*, a collection of music in honor of the Virgin Mary. About half of the selections are from the Renaissance era, including Byrd's Ave Verum Corpus and Palestrina's Stabat Mater, with others from the 20th century by composers such as Benjamin Britten and Arvo Pärt. The CD is available at a number of outlets in the Asheville area.
